

News From Around the Anglican Communion



Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams to Resign the See of Canterbury

Archbishop Rowan Williams has announced his acceptance of the position of Master

of Magdalene College, Cambridge with effect from January 2013. He will therefore be stepping down from the office of Archbishop of Canterbury at the end of December 2012.

Dr Williams' intentions have been conveyed to The Queen, who is Supreme Governor of the Church of England and who formally appoints the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Dr Williams was appointed the one hundred and fourth Archbishop of Canterbury in 2002. He said,

"It has been an immense privilege to serve as Archbishop of Canterbury over the past decade, and moving on has not been an easy decision. During the time remaining there is much to do, and I ask your prayers and support in this period and beyond. I am abidingly grateful to all those friends and colleagues who have so generously supported Jane and myself in these years, and all the many diverse parishes and communities in the Church of England and the wider

Anglican Communion that have brought vision, hope and excitement to my own ministry. I look forward, with that same support and inspiration, to continuing to serve the Church's mission and witness as best I can in the years ahead."

Dr Williams will continue to carry out all the duties and responsibilities of the Archbishop of Canterbury, both for the Church of

England and the Anglican Communion, until the end of the year.

The Crown Nominations Commission will consider in due course the selection of a successor.



THE LITURGICAL CORNER







The Body of Christ, the Bread of Heaven.

Reverence before Christ in the Eucharist

Have we, as a culture, lost our sense of the mysterium? How has technology, social media and our fast paced world affected our ability to enter into the Holy mysteries of the Eucharist? It is often difficult to slow down and reflect on what we are about to experience when coming together in the Eucharistic Presence of our Blessed Lord, Jesus Christ.

Reconsidering what is truly happening at the altar during the Eucharist is essential in keeping this sense of the mysterium. Two thousand years ago, our Lord said to His disciples, "Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you." Jesus says the same thing to us at each Eucharist. We receive, in communion, the body that Christ gave up for us. We receive His sacrifice, the sacrifice of the Cross, into our bodies. In other words, to be present at Mass is to be present at the foot of the Cross, just as Mary and John were two thousand years ago. The Greek word anamnesis means to *make present* the sacrifice of Jesus Christ at Calvary. When Jesus said, "Do this in remembrance of me", we are not just cognitively recalling His sacrifice. By the power of the Holy Spirit, the past is being brought into the present time. The sacrifice of Jesus at Calvary is being brought into the our midst, brought into the now. What a privilege to be invited to the "Supper of the Lamb".

Think about how vulnerable Christ makes Himself in choosing to be present in the Eucharist, and in the Tabernacle of the altar. In His

Eucharistic presence, Christ calls us to spend quiet time with Him. A number of years ago, Dan Rather interviewed Mother Theresa about praver. "What do you say to God when you pray," he inquired. "Nothing," replied Mother Theresa. "I just listen." "What does God say to you?" he responded, rather derisively. "Nothing," replied Mother Theresa. "He just listens." This is what prayer before the Blessed Sacrament becomes. We are still, silent, and we listen to God listening to us. The more time we spend before the Blessed Sacrament in silence, the more we will begin to hear God listen and, the more aware we will become of his presence in our lives. With instant access to noise and media, stillness and silence can make as all uneasy.

So, when you enter the church before Mass I encourage you to spend some quiet time with Jesus. While we may be tempted to want to talk with those around us, we need to put ourselves, "our souls and bodies" in a proper frame of reference before the start of Mass. Remember, upon entering the church we need silence and time to pray before the Lord in order to get ourselves spiritually ready to receive Him in the Eucharist.

One final note, when going up to receive Communion one should genuflect or do a solemn bow when leaving the pew and upon returning to the pew. While the consecrated Sacrament remains on the altar, the community should remain kneeling in the pews until the Sacrament is either placed in the tabernacle, or consumed by the priest.
