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THOUGHT FROM THE RECTOR

What's the difference between a priest and a doctor? One deals with matters of life and death. The other is just concerned with the health of the body.

This was a question I posed during my homily on September 22nd. The gospel that day was Jesus' parable of the shrewd steward, Lk. 16:1-13. The parable speaks of the unjust steward who has been accused of squandering his master's property. Being desperate, he takes a quick assessment of the situation. He says, "I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg." So, the steward, seeing that he is about to be fired, comes up with a rather nefarious plan. Summoning his master's debtors, he reduces the amount of debt owed by each in half.

Of course, all of Jesus' parables have a marvelous twist to them and this one is no exception. Jesus says, that the steward's master commended the dishonest steward because he had acted shrewdly. Wow! Now, Jesus is not commending us to be cheats, unethical or immoral. The steward is praised for his wisdom in knowing where his salvation lay, not for his dishonesty. He recognizes the hopelessness of his situation. This ex-steward is keenly aware of the one and only source of his "salvation," namely the generosity and mercy of his master, and risks everything to gain it. We, too, must be aware of the "hopelessness of our situation" apart from the mercy and grace of our Lord. We must be willing to, as St. Paul states, "...consider everything a loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things." **Philippians 3:8** As a result of this revelation, our spiritual becomes primary.

Like the steward in this parable, the urgency is for us to act. We can glean from this parable, that we must be as diligent our spiritual formation as we are concerning worldly issues.



Jesus reminds us,

Actually, Jesus even commends the people of the world for their dealings versus the followers of God when He said, "For the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light." Of course, we have to concern ourselves with day-to-day life and work. However, Jesus states, "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." (Matthew 6:33) It is about priorities, diligence and putting our spiritual life first.

The Christian Formation ministry at St. Uriel's strives to strengthen the spiritual lives of her members. That is why we offer women's bible studies, parish retreats, Adult Forums, Women of Faith, Order of St. Luke healing ministry, parish seminars, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew's men's ministry, youth ministry, and so much more.


This fall, Adult Forum will consist of an 8 week *Journey through the Bible*. Why is this important and how will it affect our spiritual life? We, as Anglicans, must understand the primacy of Scriptures in our life. God breathes His life into the Word. The Scriptures are a love letter from our heavenly Father and it changes lives.

So why do we have such a difficult time with God's Word? St. Jerome said that ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ. Some have said, "I don't know the Bible, I am an Episcopalian." If St. Jerome is correct, then one might as well say, "I don't know Christ because I am an Episcopalian." And so, our spiritual life, our soul is in peril. So what are we going to do about it? The question remains, will we let our spiritual life slide, or will we be like the shrewd steward in Jesus' parable? The great virtue of the shrewd steward is that he realized his desperate situation, and he acted. He did something about it.

Parents who have stood for their children at the time they were baptized have the responsibility to study God's Word, to know and understand it, and to pass it on to our children, since parents are the chief catechists. We must understand salvation history and God's plan by "reading, marking, and inwardly digesting" God's word.

When we know the Scriptures, as St. Jerome states, we will grow in our relationship with Jesus our Lord. Our sacramental life will deepen and become more intimate and our families and relationships will become transformed.

Jesus says, "It profits a man nothing to gain the whole world and lose his soul." In another words, do not gain the world if it means that you have lost your relationship with God. Do not lose the spiritual dimension. If you are linked to God; - if you have

money, your spiritual life will tell you how to use it. If you have a family, your spiritual life will tell you how to relate to them. If you have success, or fame or pleasure, your spiritual life will tell you what to do with it. Our relationship with God is of paramount significance in our lives. So , act. Act now. MATTHEW The King and His Kingdom



Matthew: The King and His Kingdom is an exciting study that explores the life and mission of Jesus as recorded in the Gospel. Matthew demonstrates how the promises and prophecies of the Old Testament are fulfilled in Christ, who establishes a New Law and inaugurates the Kingdom of Heaven on earth. Those who participate in the class will come to see Jesus as the awaited Messiah who relives the life and struggles of Israel to become the faithful and victorious King. Set in the rich context of Jesus' Jewish culture, this study will help you to understand who Jesus is and what the Incarnation of God in Jesus means for the salvation of the world. The course will also focus on the meaning of Jesus' teachings for us today. Matthew is an ideal follow-up study to the basic narrative of Scripture taught in The Bible Timeline study.

We will come to See, Learn, Witness, Discover, and Watch:

- See Jesus as the Son of David, the Son of Abraham, the New Moses, the True Manna, the New Temple — and learn what this means for us today.
- Learn how Jesus reconstituted the struggling kingdom of Israel around Himself and opened the Kingdom of God to all people.
- Witness how Christ established his Church with the Twelve Apostles, and Peter as His vicar.
- Discover the roots of the sacraments, and see how Jesus' words and actions are reflected in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.
- Watch Jesus re-live the history of Israel as the obedient Son
 who trusts the Father, defeats hell and the grave, and is
 raised to New Life by the Father.



Adult Forums for September - December

A Quick Journey Through the Bible is part of The Great Adventure Catholic Bible study system. Last spring, we offered this course in two sessions, Wednesday mornings following the 9:30am Mass and 7:00pm Wednesday evenings. This parish-based study was an excellent introduction and overview of the Bible from a Catholic perspective.

The Adult Forums will make available a simplified version of *A Quick Journey Through the Bible*, thereby giving more people an opportunity to grow in the Lord and to gain a deeper understanding of the "story".

Presented by Jeff Cavins, the *Quick Journey* study briefly covers salvation history in a series of eight, half-hour talks. Since this series will be presented at the Adult Forums this fall, we will not have time for the longer group discussions which we enjoyed during the spring course. However, there will be

opportunities to ask questions after the DVD presentations.

What is so great about this series is that it makes the complexity of the Bible simple through an easy-to-follow narrative approach aided by the color-coded Bible timeline. This is a great way to "get your feet wet" and learn how to begin authentic Catholic Bible study, especially because we will also be starting the 24 week course on the Gospel of St. Matthew.

Don't let the thought of a 24 week course scare you off. We will have a one week break at

Thanksgiving and a one week break the week of Ash Wednesday. There will be a **4 week break** at Christmas.

The timing of this course is excellent since December 1 begins the the new Lectionary Cycle - Year A. Throughout Year A the gospel readings on Sundays will be from the Gospel of St. Matthew. This course will help to bring alive the Sunday readings.

Like the Quick Journey Through the Bible Course, this course will also be offered in 2 sessions on Wednesdays. More information on this course will soon be forth coming. See page 6 in the Newsletter for more information.

Parish Retreat Feb. 21-23, 2014



Mark your calendars now for The purpose of the retreat is to refresh and revitalize the participants, giving them greater opportunity for time spent in prayer and

contemplation. The retreat rekindles and deepens one's relationship with God. One may take this opportunity to increase in the ability to clearly hear God's call and to seek God's healing grace, thereby attaining a degree of spiritual renewal. The purpose of a spiritual retreat is to temporarily leave behind the usual distractions of the world to allow relaxation and an inner change to occur. This ongoing conversion of heart is critical to deepening faith and our relationship with Jesus Christ.

People will often say, "I do not have time to go on retreat." Or, "I don't need such a thing." However, the gospels tell us that Jesus Himself needed to go on retreat. Mark [1:35-37] records for us, "Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where He prayed. Simon and his companions went to look for Him, and when they found Him, they exclaimed: 'Everyone is looking for you!'" [Mark 1: 35–37] Jesus did not go off to spend time with God only when there were no other pressing matters. On the contrary, He spent quiet time with God because there were pressing matters to attend to. Luke records, "In those days He departed to the mountain to pray, and He spent the night in prayer to God. (Luke 6:12).

Our retreat this year is scheduled for February 21-23, 2014. In past years,

our attendance has been very good averaging about 17 to 18 participants. This year, we must guarantee the Convent at least 15 participants. We can take a maximum of 26 participants.
